The CCMMS 11th Anniversary Celebration





POSTCARD from TOULOUSE

Dear Colonel Lee, Judy, and members of the CCMMS:

It's been a few months since I was last able to attend our Thursday evening meetings to record the minutes and/or to enjoy the delicious homemade Cantonese food that I cannot stop thinking about. Greetings from Toulouse, France, from Victor.

I have remained in France and continue my studies at the Political Institute of Toulouse, one of the best schools in the country for the study of politics and international relations. During my time here, I have not only come to discover a new perspective, but have also adopted it as my own. While I could only speak the language a little while ago, I can now think with it; while once subjects such as French politics or EU community law only came alive to me through books and journal articles, I now discuss and debate them with my peers, as I would the laws and politics of my own country.

I have also had the opportunity to travel a little bit in Europe. I went to Italy for Christmas and Spring Break. This month I plan to go to Normandy and walk around the D-day beaches. It will definitely make me think about what I learned from the CCMMS in the last few years.

I have been accepted at Columbia, Cornell, and Georgetown Law Schools, and I'm still waiting for Harvard's decision. So please keep me in your prayers and wish me luck!

If everything goes according to plan, I shall be back in Vancouver soon. It will be an honour to see all of you again.

Personal Reminiscences of Dan Lee by Larry Wong

There were occasions when I would phone Dan to ask for a lift to attend a veterans' function or an event. He was always prompt in picking me up in his white Volkswagen Jetta and, in typical fashion, he didn't follow the main streets to get to his destination. Instead, he took side streets and avoided the more heavily travelled roads. He always made good time as he knew the city streets like the back of his hand.

Dan was my Assistant Curator at the Museum. He helped as a technical consultant and assisted me with the displays. He also conducted tours of the museum.

Not long ago, the Historica-Dominion Institute held a history fair on war veterans in West Vancouver. Dan came dressed in his old Air Force uniform, which was a rare sight, and he stood by a pictorial exhibit of his wartime years in Britain. Crowds of students and teachers were drawn to Dan and they asked him lots of questions about his war experiences.

Dan was born in 1920 in Chinatown, and he was the 11th child of 14 children. Although his father was an optometrist in Chinatown, he died at a young age and left Dan to be raised by his grandfather, the Reverend Chan Yu Tan. Reverand Chan had come to Canada in 1896 and he was one of the first Chinese missionaries in Chinatown.

Dan joined the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) in 1942, after moving to Toronto to take a 16-week Advanced Technical Course. After a year of training, he was posted to Transport Command at Biggin Hill, England. As an Aero Mechanic, Dan worked on Dakotas, the Flying Fortresses and the Liberators.

After the war, Dan returned to Toronto and became active in seeking an apology from the federal government for the racist Head Tax. Dan and Douglas Jung became founders of the National Congress of Chinese Canadians (NCCC). The Pacific Unit 280 veterans group -- the Army, Navy and Air Force Veterans of Canada (ANAVETS) -- agreed to a government apology, only. In an interview, Dan said "A genuine apology is all that is needed to put to rest this Head Tax issue along with our ancestors. We said we do not want compensation."

Dan became the President of Pacific Unit 280 several times. His leadership and devotion caught the attention of the Army ANAVETS, who awarded him with the highly regarded Award of Merit. Dan was also recognized by the Chinese Cultural Centre of Greater Vancouver as Senior Citizen of the Year in 2009.

Sadly, he passed away January 26, 2010. We will miss him dearly.


